D. eighteen hundred and seventy one personally appeared before me, George Bloch Clerk of the County Court of Warren Missouri a Court of Record in and for the County and State aforesaid, John Kent, aged Seventy five years, a resident of Montgomery, County of Warren, State of Missouri, who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is married; that his wife's name was Catherine Sumwalt, to whom he was married near Fayette Missouri, on the 25th day of September 1817, 1

; that he served the full period of sixty days in the (1) Military service of the United States in the War of 1812, that he is the identical John Kent who (2) enlisted in Captain James Calloway's Company, Called Missouri Regiment, Mauers Brigade, Division, at the town of St Charles, on the 22nd day of May, 1814, and was honorably discharged at Kennedy's Fort St Charles Missouri on the 3rd day of May, 1815; that (3) this service was

under Col Mupel Mays Boon and
General Howard was with an
engagement with the Indians
and British at Mock Island, under
Mays Boon, the service was full
in marching, had a bounty land warrant for
100 acres my discharge was sent to Washington & it
is still there, don't remember no of Land Warrant

Kent. – Isaac KENT, of Kentucky, lost his parents when he was quite young, and was “bound out” to be raised. When he was of age he married Lucy HOPKINS, and they had – John [KENT], William [KENT], Jane [KENT], Andrew [KENT], Robert [KENT], Elizabeth [KENT], Polly [KENT], Thomas [KENT], Isaac [KENT], Dozier [KENT], Louisa [KENT], and Lucinda [KENT]. Mr. Kent came to Missouri and settled in Warren county [Missouri] in 1819. His son John [KENT] married Catharine ZUMWALT. William married Mary A. ZUMWALT, and was killed by Waller GRAVES, who was insane, at the house of Newton HOWELL, on the 2d of October, 1830. Andrew KENT enlisted as a soldier in the Mexican war, and was burned to death in one of the forts captured by the Americans. Robert, Elizabeth, Isaac, Polly, and Thomas all moved to Oregon. John KENT was a ranger in Callaway’s company.
